
- build stronger relationships

From the Deputy Principal - Mr Steven Lake

As we come to the end of Term Two, students are looking forward to a well-earned break. Students in the younger year levels are encouraged to take some time to experience some downtime away from school. For our senior students, this is a time where they can experience some non-school time, but also an opportunity to catch up on incomplete work from this past term. Students are reminded to submit their assessments on time to allow teachers to use this information to build an accurate picture of the student's learning journey. As such, parents are encouraged to connect with staff next week during the parent/teacher interview process to unpack Term Two learning and future goal setting.



As we move into the final weeks of term, I would like to congratulate those students competing in various sporting activities, ranging from the Country Netball Cup to Athletics. I would like to ask that as many students as possible participate in the athletics carnival in some way, so as to broaden their school experiences and continue to drive the house spirit among our house teams. School Reminders and Information

Qld State Title Whip cracking – All the best for the students competing at the State Title Whip cracking Championships this weekend. We will inform our community of their results in next week's newsletter.

<u>Late Drop off & Early Pickups</u> – A reminder to parents & caregivers, if your child arrives late, they are to sign in at the school office where they will be given a late pass to give to their teacher. This ensures they are marked present on the roll and confirm home arrangements (Bus, Drop and Go, etc.)

If you need to collect your student early, we ask ALL parents and carers to arrive at the office first. Only parents, legal guardians, or authorised individuals listed on the child's emergency contact form are allowed to do so. If you have organised another person to collect your child, the school will require a phone call/email/letter advising this, and proper identification will be required to verify the person's identity.

Our school has sign-out procedures in place to record the time and date when a child is collected early. This helps maintain accurate attendance records. To ensure the safety of all students, St John's has specific protocols in place for early departure. These procedures are designed to safeguard the well-being of the students.

<u>School Day Reminders</u> - Supervision commences each day at school at 8am. We ask that students come and sit at the hall until teachers have finished their before-school meetings. At 8:30am, teachers will collect their students from this area and move to their classrooms. This gives the students 15 minutes to unpack their school bags and prepare for the school day, which commences at 8:45am. Reminder: If your child arrives after 8:45am, please come into the school office to sign them in. Student pick-up in the undercover area at the hall is from 2:55pm, and supervision in this area will finish at 3:15pm.

It is school policy that parents/carers or students are not allowed in classrooms unattended by school staff, for confidentiality reasons.

<u>Prep Enrolments - All current school families</u> - To be guaranteed a position in Prep 2024, if there are any current families who have not put in their application for enrolment, if you could do so as soon as possible. WHAT IS BOOMERANG BAGS ABOUT?

HOW IT ALL BEGAN. (THE EVOLUTION OF BB)

In 2013, we started a conversation about plastic. How it was overflowing landfills, floating in the oceans, strangling marine life and causing all sorts of trouble. So what could be done about it?

We brainstormed about the idea of providing reusable bags for the community to use instead of plastic. This raised the questions of 'Where would the bags come from?', 'How do we make sure this is sustainable and ethical without creating more waste?'. Then came the lightbulb moment – "Let's MAKE the bags using discarded fabric!" But there was a problem with this idea...we couldn't sew.

So we called upon the community – schools, sewing groups, universities, community organisations, councils, businesses, you name it – to collect fabric and help us turn it into bags. Bagmaking bees became a valuable platform to connect with each other, share stories, divert waste from landfill, learn new skills, become more conscious about important environmental and social issues (not just plastic) and have furl

The initiative spread with unbridled enthusiasm, and is now in over 1000 communities worldwide. Hundreds of thousands of plastic bags have been saved from landfill, and behaviour change went way beyond the bag to other single-use plastics and sustainable living. Not to mention the immeasurable social impact of the conversations, connections and new friendships created in the process!

Perhaps, it's not about the plastic bag at all.

WHAT HAPPENED TO THE BORROW AND BRING BACK' LOGO?

At first, we piloted Boomerang Bags in stands and boxes at shops for people to use when they had that 'I forgot my bag!' moment. This seemed like a brilliant idea at the time, HOWEVER in practice it did not quite go to plan. Staff were too busy to let customers know what the bags were about and opportunities for important conversations and 'the why' were lost. The bags were left in cupboards at home rather than returned and volunteers became discouraged in efforts to keep boxes topped up. Questions about hygiene of shared bags became more and more common. With these factors in mind, our communities reported that the 'borrow and bring back' model was ineffective, and collectively we made a few changes.

We learned quickly that the most valuable part of the project was mobilising the community to take part in what has become a global social and environmental movement. Connecting with each other and having conversations became as important as tackling plastic bag use!

Whether you make one bag and gift it to your friend, or make hundreds of bags and donate them to a local food bank, or a school library... it's about connecting people, showing acts of kindness and starting important conversations that foster sustainable behaviour. It's about stirring consciousness and working together as a community to create solutions to important global issues, that give us hope for a healthy future!

The messages on the bags are now 'BRING YOUR OWN BAG' and 'CHOOSE TO REUSE' (more info about logo's can be found under the LOGO tab). You'll also find lots of helpful ideas about meaningful ways to distribute the bags under DISTRIBUTING. <u>Year 8 Drama</u> - Year 8A have put on Send in the Clowns Drama performance. Thank you to the primary students who came to be our very enthusiastic audience during their playtime.





Healthy Kids Program

Kingaroy 2023



The Healthy Kids Program is a 5 month behaviour change program that has been developed to help children aged 5-12 and families enjoy a healthier lifestyle together. The program is designed to assist children who are overweight or obese. However, it is eligible for all primary aged children who may benefit from improved diet and lifestyle behaviours.

What does the program include:

- Input from dietitian, exercise physiologist, child health nurse and psychologist.
- Each month offered 1 x group education session and 1 x individual session with paediatric dietitian. To get the most out of this program it is expected that participants will attend all sessions.
- Workbook with notes on each session and weekly nutrition, exercise and wellbeing activities to complete at home

Topics covered include:

- Breakfast, lunch boxes, meal planning and family meal ideas.
- Good food choices and movement
- Mindful eating
- Healthy sleep and screen time.

Cost: The program is free of charge

Location: Allied Health, The Annexe, Kingaroy Hospital

Referrals: Via Smart Referrals – direct referral to the Dietetics department and indicate the referral is for Healthy Kids Program.

1 Introduction

The South Burnett Musical Comedy Society (SBMCS) is excited to announce that Zoe Basham will be directing our production of **Annie Jr** alongside musical director and choreographer Sue Dowideit-Reiger. This Creative Team has extensive experience within the performing arts as well as working with young people both on and off stage.

Based on the popular Tony-winning musical Annie, this condensed show features a wonderful score written by Charles Strouse and Martin Charnin, including the smash hit, "Tomorrow".
